The Northern Flicker~

The largest woodpecker in our area is the Northern Flicker at 12 to 12.5 inches in length. The subspecies that is most common in our area is the "Red-Shafted" variety. In flight, the undersides of the wings are red-orange in color. (The "Yellow-shafted" form can also be seen in San Diego County.) Flickers are here year-round but they are most common between the months of October and April.

The Northern Flicker is a very colorful bird with a barred brown back and a spotted breast. The top of the head is brown while the throat and cheeks are light grey in color. The bill is black and the bird has a distinctive black "bib". The male has a red mustache stripe that the female lacks. Both sexes have a white rump.

Like other woodpeckers, Northern Flickers eat tree-boring insects, flying insects, berries and acorns. They also eat ants. They prefer areas with tall trees such as oaks and sycamore so they are commonly found in our canyon bottoms. They can also be seen in tall trees in suburban yards.

The Northern Flicker makes a number of different vocalizations. The first is a "klee-yer" which sounds similar to a Cooper's Hawk. The second is "wick, wick, wick, wick" and the third sounds like "flick-a, flick-a" which is how the bird got its name. If you are hiking the canyon bottom and you hear one of these sounds, scan the tree tops and you may see one of these colorful woodpeckers.


